ALL SAINTS' DAY

A reading from St. Paul's Epistle to the Hebrews (11:32- 12:2:)

Brethren, what more shall I say? I have not the time to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah of David and Samuel, and the prophets, who by faith conquered kingdoms, did what was righteous, obtained the promises; they closed the mouths of lions, put out raging fires, escaped the devouring sword; out of weakness they were made powerful, became strong in battle, and turned back foreign invaders. Women received back their dead through resurrection. Some were tortured and would not accept deliverance, in order to better resurrection. Others endured mockery, scourging and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, sawed in two, put to death at the sword's point; they went about in skins of sheep or goats, needy, afflicted, tormented. The world was not worthy of them. They wandered about in deserts and on mountains, in caves and in crevices of the earth. Yet all these, though approved because of their faith, did not receive what had been promised. God had foreseen something better for us, so that without us they should not be made perfect. Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us rid ourselves of every burden and sin that clings to us and preserve in running the race that lies before us while keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus,

the leader and perfecter of faith. For the sake of the joy the lay before him he endured the cross, despising its shame, and has taken his seat at the right of the throne of God.

Gospel of Matthew 10:32-33, 37-38; 19:27-30:



The Lord said to his disciples, “Everyone who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge him before my Father in heaven. But whoever disowns me before men, I in turn will disown him before my Father in heaven. Do not think that I have come to send peace upon the earth; I have come to bring a sword, not peace. For I have come to set a man at variance with his father, and a daughter with her mother, and a daughter-in-law with her mother-in-law; and a man’s enemies will be those of his own household. He who loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and he who loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me and he who does not take up his cross and follow me, is not worthy of me.” Then Peter addressed him saying, “Behold, we have left all and followed you; what then shall we have?” And Jesus said to them, “Amen I say to you that you who have followed me, in the regeneration when the Son of Man shall sit on the throne of his glory, shall also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left house, or brothers, or sisters, or father, or mother, or wife, or children, or lands, for my name’s sake, shall receive a hundredfold, and shall possess life everlasting. But many who are first now will be last, and many who are last will be first.”

ASK FATHER A QUESTION? Father, I haven't gone to my home Parish for almost two years-I take my elderly mother to her Parish- I enjoy visiting your Parish many times a year also, in paying my tithes (donations) to my Parish what should I do? I feel like I am not donating enough to your Parish.

My suggestion to you first off, is to let your Home Parish Priest know that you are attending a Liturgy (Mass) every Sunday somewhere and are not staying away from the Holy Apostolic Church. Also, let him know, that because your mother is unable to drive herself to her Parish - that you have been taking her to church every Sunday. Concerning your home Parish, the bare minimum you should do in your absence is to offer in donation what the church calls your yearly dues and the "first" donation which is typically the first two envelopes in your envelope box. This simple act lets your priest know that you are still his parishioner and the "first" donation actually covers the cost of the donation box.

Recognizing that our donation is to God, and you could give 100% of your donations to your home Parish by mail in your physical absence. My suggestion is to give your Sunday donation to the Parish you are actually visiting.

I understand you would like to do more for my Parish and your Home Parish, write or call your home Parish and speak with the Priest regarding your situation and ask if there is a financial need that you can specifically address. Perhaps, on the Sundays that you attend Transfiguration of Our Lord or St. Peter & Paul Church, for example, you can split the donation between your Mom's Parish and the Secondary Parish that you attend.

An additional suggestion is to take one donation a month and mail it to your home Parish even in your absence. (There would be no need to donate to any of the other Parishes that you attend that week.)

The Feast of All Saints

Celebrated by the Early Church on the Sunday after Pentecost



All Saint's Day is a Christian holy day observed by Eastern churches on the first Sunday after Pentecost, keeping the traditional date as celebrated in the early church. The feast was transferred for the Latin church to November 1 in 835 by Pope Gregory IV. The day now honors all saints of the church, even those not known by name.

All Saint's Day is celebrated by Roman Catholics, Eastern Christians, both Catholic & Orthodox, Anglicans, and Lutherans. However, because of their differing understandings of the identity and function of the saints, what these churches do on the Feast of All Saints differs widely. For Roman Catholics, Eastern Christians, both Catholic and Orthodox, and to some extent, Anglicans, All Saints is a day to remember, thank God for, but also to venerate and pray to the saints in heaven as intercessors for various helps. In the early days the Christians were accustomed to solemnize the anniversary of a martyr's death for Christ at the place of martyrdom. In the fourth century, neighboring dioceses began to interchange feasts, to transfer relics, to divide them, and to join in a common feast. Frequently groups of martyrs suffered on the same day, which naturally led to a joint commemoration. In the persecution of Diocletian the number of martyrs became so great that a separate day could not be assigned to each. The Church, feeling that every martyr should be venerated, appointed a common day for all.

The first trace of the observance of this feast on the Sunday after Pentecost is found in Antioch. In the fourth and fifth centuries there is also mention of a common day in a sermon of Saint Ephrem the Syrian, and in the 74th homily of Saint John Chrysostom of Constantinople. At first only martyrs and Saint John the Baptist were honored by a special day. Other saints were added gradually and increased in number when a regular process of canonization was established. As early as 411 there is in the Chaldean Calendar a Commemoratio confessorum for the Friday after Easter. In the sixth century, Pope Boniface IV accepted the Pantheon as a gift from the Emperor Phocas and proclaimed May 13, 610 Feast of All Holy Martyrs held. He dedicated it as the Church of Santa Maria Rotonda in honor of the Blessed Virgin and all martyrs.

During Pope Gregory III's reign, the festival was expanded to include all saints and a chapel in St. Peter's church was dedicated accordingly. In 835, Pope Gregory IV changed the date to November 1 for the Latin Church and the name to Feast of All Saints.
