Believers in <u>Ukraine</u> and <u>Belarus</u> as former parts of the <u>Polish–Lithuanian</u> <u>Commonwealth</u>- <u>Ukrainians</u> have a special devotion to the Madonna of Częstochowa. The icon is often mentioned in <u>Ukrainian folk songs</u> from the 16th and 17th centuries.

Something to think about...

I have spoken with people who think there is an easy solution to the problem that church is sometimes boring. They say we should simply do what other churches do: Make the service shorter. Have a drama or some dancers. Make the music more exciting. Tell more jokes. I don't know what to say to this, especially when an Orthodox person is making the suggestion. I feel like we've almost lost that person. His concept of what it means to worship God has deteriorated to such a degree that we cannot speak the same language anymore. Is it really possible to take the atmosphere of a comedy club or stadium concert into church and expect that our worship of God will not change? Change really isn't a strong enough word here. Can we imagine our worship of God would not be destroyed? Look back on history and see examples of how the changing of one word in the creed or in the translation of Scripture has opened giant rifts between ancient churches. One word! One thought! One nuance of theology! The tiniest division in one century becomes an Insurmountable rupture in the next. - FROM Page 35; Chapt 3:Help! I'm Bored In Church! -David R. Smith



PRAYER TO SAINT MICHAEL (Feast Day September 6)

Holy Michael, the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our safeguard against the wickedness and snares of the devil. ASK FATHER A QUESTION? What is the purpose of Blessing Icons? The Realm of Angels and Devils is real. When a Blessing is given, and note, there are different levels of Blessing, the power of Angels and God is imparted on the person or item that is receiving the Blessing. The items or people receive the grace of God necessary in the amount God chooses to bestow on them at the request of the Priest and the Church. These objects or people with the power imparted upon them, becomes a means to have power over devils and sin and to help the faithful live a virtuous live. God imparts the graces necessary for the people to aid them in their struggle for sanctification.



DORMITION OF THE MOST HOLY THEOTOKOS

Mary hath chosen that good part. (Luke 10:42). The Dormition of the Mother of God represents a good end to such a choice. At her Dormition the Savior Himself received her soul into His arms. Many saints were made worthy of the same. In various ways and to varying degrees, all those who choose that good part encounter this. At the time this choice is made, the saints foresee this end through hope, and even feel it to a certain degree. But then labors, struggles, and forcing of oneself come, one after another, and obscure the chosen path. The good end of that good part remains as a guiding star. It is as a faraway shining light for a traveler who is overtaken by darkness. Hope is the stimulator of energy and maintainer of patience and constancy in what was begun, while hope itself is strong through faith. People make their choice according to faith, and through hope they are firm in their choice, while through patience they attain that good end. -From St. Theophan the Recluse

October 1- Protection of the Theotokos



To understand the love of Ukrainians for the Madonna of Pokrov, we must go back to the 10th century. At that time, whenever the Byzantine Empire (recall that its capital city was Constantinople) was threatened by the Arabs or Slavs, the Virgin Mary appeared with St. John the Baptist and St. John. The Virgin Mary and these two saints appeared to St. Andrew, called Andrew the "Fool for Christ," in

the Church of the Blachernae in Constantinople. This church is an illustrious Marian shrine and a very beautiful church in the city. During the apparition, the Blessed Mother went in tears to the altar, placing her own veil that covered her head over the people to protect and save them. "Pokrov" means "the veil" in the literal sense and borrows, from the Hebrew of the Old Testament, seter (veil), the figurative sense of "protection" or "security." The feast of the Pokrov icon therefore means, in other words, Our Lady of Protection. This feast, which commemorates her appearance, has been proclaimed the national holiday of **Ukraine**. During the time of the Soviet and Nazi occupation, this icon took on immense importance for the Ukrainian nation, which reveres it as one of its favorite icons. Interestingly, this festival was established in Russia in the 12th century during the reign of Prince Andrew Bogolioubsky (1157-1174), whose patron saint was St. Andrew. Outside Russia, it is celebrated in Ukraine, but also in Bulgaria, Romania and also in Greece. The icon of Pokrov represents the Mother of God standing in orans (praying position) with her arms raised, in a Byzantine church decor, and accompanied by the saints. Two variations exist: either the Virgin herself spreads her veil widely, or two angels spread the veil over the people. Above the extended veil stands the bust of Christ. Pokrov's prayer to the Virgin alludes to her veil shining over the saved crowd:

Cover us, O Queen with the mantle of mercy, O Pokrov and defense of men, Pokrov and defense of believers. By your help the Orthodox kings are crowned ... On this day we celebrate your luminous feast, O Mother of God, we the faithful protected by your coming and, contemplating your venerable icon, with tenderness we say: cover us with your holy protection and deliver us from all evil, praying your Son, Christ our God, to grant our souls salvation."
