FOURTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST SEPTEMBER 3, 2023

The Lord told this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a king who made a marriage feast for his son. Again, he sent out other servants, saying, 'Tell those who are invited, behold, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and fatlings are killed, and everything is ready;

come to the marriage feast.' But they made light of it, and went off, one to his own farm, and another to his business; and the rest laid hold of his servants, treated them shamefully, and killed them. But when the king heard of it, he was angry; and he sent his armies, destroyed those murderers, and burnt their city. 

The Liturgical Year (Begins September 1) HOLY DAYS

The ecclesiastical year, in the Eastern tradition begins on the first of September, is divided between movable and immovable, or fixed, holy days. The movable holy days are determined by the date of Pascha (Easter), the most important of all feast days and The Central Feast of the Liturgical Year. The determination of the date of Pascha was definitively regulated by the decision of the First Ecumenical Council, held in Nicaea (325 A.D.). Next in importance to Pascha are the "Twelve Great Feasts," of which three are movable. Eight of these feasts are devoted to Christ and four to the Theotokos (The Birth-giver, Mary). There are also a number of feast days of varying importance, most of which commemorate the more popular saints. The "Twelve Major Feast Days," as they occur in chronological order after September 1, are as follows:

The Nativity of the Theotokos (Virgin Mary) (September 8)

The Elevation of the Life-giving Cross (September 14)

The Presentation of the Theotokos (Virgin Mary) in the Temple (November 21)

Christmas (December 25)

Epiphany (January 6)

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple (February 2)

The Annunciation (March 25)

Palm Sunday (the Sunday before Easter)

Feast of Ascension (40 days after Easter)

Pentecost (50 days after Easter)

The Transfiguration of Our Lord and Savior(August 6)

The Dormition of the Theotokos (August 15)

Fast Days and Fast Periods

Four main fast periods are included in the ecclesiastical year. They are:

The Great Fast (Lent)--beginning on a Monday 7 weeks before Pascha.

Fast of the Apostles--varying in length from 1 to 6 weeks; it begins on a Monday, 8 days after Pentecost, and ends on June 28--the eve of the feast of Saints Peter and Paul.

Fast of the Dormition of the Theotokos Mary--August 1 to 14.

Philips Fast--lasting 40 days, from November 15 to December 24, so named because the fast begins the day following the Feast Day of St. Philip.

Individual fast days include the feast of the Elevation of the Holy Cross (September 14), the Beheading of St. John the Baptist (August 29), and the eve of Epiphany (January 5), as well as all Wednesdays and Fridays. There is no fasting, however, between Christmas and Epiphany, during the tenth week before Pascha, the week after Pascha because the whole week is Pascha, the week after Pentecost and the Wednesdays or Fridays of Post-Feast Periods of major Holy Days. Although the term fast, denotes total abstinence from food or drink, fasting as practiced in the Church means abstinence from meat, fish, dairy products, olive oil, and wine.

FOURTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

A king arranged a wedding for his son. He sent once for those who were bidden and sent for them a second time, but because of earthly cares they did not come- one was occupied at home, another with business. A new invitation was made to others, and the wedding chamber was furnished with guests. Among them was found one not dressed for the wedding, and he therefore was cast out. The meaning of this parable is clear: The wedding is the Kingdom of Heaven, the invitation is the preaching of the Gospel, those who refused are those who did not believe at all, and the one who was not dressed for the wedding believed but did not live according to his faith. Each of us must discern for himself to which category he belongs. That we are bidden is clear, but are we believers? Indeed, it is possible to be among the believers, to be called by name, and completely lack faith. One person does not think at all about faith, as though it did not exist: another knows a little about it and is satisfied; another interprets the Faith in a distorted way; another relates to it with complete animosity. All are considered to be Christians, although they have absolutely nothing which is Christian. If you believe, determine whether your feelings and deeds conform to your faith-these are the garment of the soul, by which God sees you as dressed for the wedding or not. It is possible to know the Faith well and be zealous for it, but in actual life to serve the passions-to dress, that is, in the shameful clothes of a sin-loving soul. Such people are one way in the word, but another way in the heart. On their tongue is, "Lord, Lord!" but within they are saying, "Have me excused." Examine yourself, whether you are in the Faith (cf. IICor. 13:5) and wearing the clothes of the virtues or wearing the shameful tatters of sin and passions. -From St. **Theophan the Recluse**
