PROTECTION OF THE THEOTOKOS October 1, 2023



TROPAR: Though the stone was sealed by the Judeans, and soldiers guarded Your most pure body, You arose, O Savior, on the third day, and gave life to the world. And so the heavenly powers cried out to You, O Giver of Life: Glory to Your resurrection, O Christ! Glory to Your kingdom! Glory to Your saving plan, O only Lover of mankind.

TROPAR: Today we believers radiantly celebrate, flooded in light by your coming to us, O Mother of God; beholding your pure image, we say with contrition: shelter us with your precious protection and

deliver us from every evil, entreating Your Son, Christ our god, to save our souls. Glory be to the Father, and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit.

KONDAK: Today the Virgin stands before us in the church and together with the choirs of saints invisibly prays to God for us. Angels are worshipping with hierarchs, Apostles exult with prophets, for the Mother of God prays in our behalf to the eternal God. **Now and forever and ever. Amen.**

KONDAK: You arose in glory from the tomb and with Yourself You raised the world. All mankind acclaims You as God, and death has vanished. Adam exults, O Master, and Eve, redeemed now from bondage, cries out for joy: "You are the One, O Christ, Who offer resurrection to all."

PROKEIMON: Let Your mercy, O Lord, be upon us, as we have hoped in You. Rejoice in the Lord, O you just; praise befits the righteous. My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit has rejoiced in God my Savior.

A Reading of the Second Epistle of the Holy Apostle Paul to the Corinthians (9:6-11):

Brethren, what agreement has the temple of God with idols? For we are the temple of the living God; as God said, "I will live in them and walk among them, and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. Therefore, come out from them, and be separate from them, says the Lord, and touch nothing unclean; then I will welcome you, and I will be your father, and you shall be my sons and daughters, says the Lord Almighty." Since we have these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from every defilement of body and of spirit, making holiness perfect in the fear of God.

ALLELUIA: Alleluia (3) God gives me vindication, and has subdued peoples under me. Alleluia (3). Making great the salvation of the king, and showing mercy to His anointed, to David, and to His posterity forever. Alleluia (3). Hear, O daughter, and see, and incline your ear. Alleluia (3).

A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Luke 6:31-36; Luke 10:38-42; 11:27-28:

The Lord said, "Even as you wish men to do to you, so also do you to them. And if you love those who love you, what merit have you? For even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what merit have you? For even sinners do that. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive in return, what merit have you? For even sinners lend to sinners that they may get back as much in return. But love your enemies, and do good, and lend, not hoping for any return, and your reward shall be great, and you shall be children of the Most High, for he is kind towards the ungrateful and evil. Be merciful, therefore, even as your Father is merciful."

COMMUNION HYMN: Praise the Lord from the heavens; praise Him in the highest. I will take the cup of salvation; and I will call upon the name of the Lord. Alleluia (3).

PROTECTION OF THE THEOTOKOS (October 1)- The Protection of the Theotokos is one of the most beloved feast days on the Orthodox/Ukrainian Catholic calendar among the Slavic peoples, commemorated on October 1. The feast is celebrated additionally on October 28 in the Greek tradition. It is also known as the feast of the Virgin Mary's Cerement. In most Slavic languages the word "cerement" has a dual meaning of "veil" and "protection." The Russian/Ukrainian word **Pokrov** (Покров), like the Greek Skepi (Σκέπη), has a complex meaning. First of all, it refers to a cloak or shroud, but it also means protection or intercession. For this reason, the name of the feast is variously translated as the Veil of Our Lady, the Protecting Veil of the Theotokos, the Protection of the Theotokos, or the Intercession of the Theotokos. The Protection is commemorated most fervently in Slavic churches, probably because St. Andrei was a Slav. The first celebration of the Theotokos' cerement in the Russian Orthodox /Ukrainian Catholic Church calendar dates back from the 12th century and today is celebrated throughout the Orthodox/Ukrainian Catholic Church calendar. The feast day commemorating the miracle is celebrated with an All-Night Vigil, with many of the same elements as occur on Great Feasts of the Theotokos. However, this feast has no post feast.

Prayer For Peace in Ukraine

Heavenly Father, Your Son taught us "Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called the sons of God." We fervently pray in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, that you inspire men to become peacemakers. May mankind seek reconciliation and peace as is Your Will in this world. May tranquility be restored to all nations and especially Ukraine. God, Our Father, we beseech You to comfort the suffering, heal the wounded, and accept the souls of the dearly departed into Your heavenly kingdom. May the Most Holy Mother of God extend Her Mantle of Protection over Ukraine and the whole world. May each of us always live our lives as instruments of Your peace, in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Amen.



ASK FATHER A QUESTION? What is Vespers and Litiya? Why are we doing Vespers now – is this new? Jesus taught us to pray without ceasing. When God He created man, the first thing He said to Adam, in their conversation, was to have something to eat and have a good night's sleep. This was the first Vespers, Adam conversing with God. Implementing prayer without ceasing, means we pray at all hours of the day. Vespers happens when the sun is low in the sky, beginning to set, the commotion of the day ending, and the calmness of the evening setting-in. Our cycle of communal prayer to God, begins in this evening prayer which we call Vespers, coming from the Latin word "Vesper" meaning evening. Litiya, as part of Vespers, happens only on the eve of the Major Holy Days, it is not part of Daily Vespers.

CHURCH DICTIONARY: LITIYA - (*Lity, litia*) A word implying a fervent, prolonged prayer. It is a service of blessing of the breads joined to the Vespers on the eve of major feasts. Five breads, oil and wine are blessed. In the prayer of blessing, we ask our Lord that as He blessed the five loaves and fed the five thousand, to bless the loaves, wheat, wine and oil, and to multiply them in all the world; and to sanctify all the faithful who partake of them. The bread is cut and distributed to the faithful at the end of the service.

Vespers began when God created us, no, this not new, this is ancient. Every week is a Little Holy Week, and every Sunday is a Little Resurrection of our Blessed Lord. Every Saturday evening, we should be doing Saturday Evening Vespers, which in itself has it's own uniqueness within the context of Daily Vespers. This change of the Liturgical Prayer Cycle, from Saturday Vespers to Saturday Liturgy, occurred after Vatican II and this change thereby is telling us, in a backward way, that Jesus rose from the Dead Saturday Evening, not Sunday Morning. We are doing Vespers as we always should by request of some of the Parishioners.

The fundamental, original commandment is: Love! It is a small word, but it expresses an all-encompassing thing. It is easy to say that you must love, but it is not easy to attain love to the necessary degree. It is also not exactly clear how to attain it. This is why the Savior surrounds this commandment with other explanatory rules: Love thy neighbor as thyself (Matt. 19:19;22:39; Mark 12:31) and, As you would that men should do to you, do you also to them likewise (Luke 6:31). Here is shown a degree of love that one can call boundless; for is there any limit to one's love for oneself? And is there any good which one would not want for himself from others? However, this injunction is not impossible to fulfill. The matter depends upon having perfect compassion towards others, in order to fully transfer their feelings to yourself, to feel the way they feel. When this occurs, there will be no need to point out what you must do for others in a given situation: your heart will show you. Just take care to maintain compassion. Otherwise, egoism will immediately approach and return you to yourself and confine you within yourself. Then you will not lift a finger for the sake of someone else, and will not look at him, though he might be dying. When the Lord says, Love thy neighbor as thy self, He means that our neighbor instead of ourselves should be within us, that is, within our heart. If our "I" remains there as before, we cannot expect anything good to come of it.
