The clarity of vision and certitude of those who have the gift of faith is sometimes misunderstood even by those who have faith. Hence, a Catholic is sometimes impatient with one who has not the faith, wrongly thinking that the reason he sees the truth so clearly is because of his own innate cleverness, and the reason his neighbor does not see it is due either to his stupidity or his stubbornness. Faith, it must be remembered, is not due to our wisdom, and the lack of faith is not due to their ignorance. Faith is solely a gift of God. "Flesh and blood has not revealed it to you, but my Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 16:17) If you have not the faith, have you not often considered as utterly foolish, absurd, and superstitious the judgements, the philosophy of life, and the outlook of those who live by faith? You think a Catholic, for instance, has surrendered both his freedom and his reason by obeying the laws of the church and by accepting the truth of Christ in His Church. Your judgement, then is very much like one who looks at the windows of the church from outside, where they seem to be a meaningless confusion of leaden lines and dull colors. Once inside the church, the leaden lines fade away as the pattern reveals itself vibrant with colors and life. In like manner, the Church may seem bewildering to those who are outside, but once you enter it, you will discover an order and harmony and "beauty that leaves all other beauty pain." The world today seems much more united in it's negation of belief than in it's acceptance of a belief. The older generation could give you at least ten reasons for a wrong belief, such as a belief in materialism, but the modern man cannot give even one bad reason for total unbelief. -Remade for Happiness, Venerable Archbishop Fulton J. TRANSFIGURATION OF OUR LORD CEMETERY: As many Parishioners are well aware the Cemetery Fence requires some repair; the Men's Work Group has graciously offered to repair the fence. A cement-mixer would be great. They have assessed it and here is what is expected to be needed, see below. If any Parishioner(s) can help obtain materials at a discount

through work, etc. please contact the rectory If anyone would like to volunteer their time to help the men's group through the course of the repair —it will take at least all summer, please contact the rectory. We are extremely grateful that the men have donated their time to this project. Thank You! If you would like to make a donation, see the schedule below.

ASSESSMENT OF CEMETERY FENCE

18 Post concrete bases need to be removed and re-poured. Numerous (if not most) sections of fence are missing the bottom bolts. Some top sections of the fence need to be reattached with angle iron / welded.

The use of 16-inch Sonotube was decided.

Here is the materials list for each post to be replaced:

2 Foot X 16 Inch Sonotube \$10.71 (Cut from a 4-foot tube @ \$21.42 each)

6 - 50 LB bags of concrete (3 Cubic feet per post) \$3.33 for 50# or \$6.91 for 50# Fast Setting

3/8 X 2 or 2 ½ inch galvanized bolts about \$1.50 per bolt (Volume discount)

3/8-inch galvanized nuts about \$.40 per nut (Volume discount)

3/8-inch galvanized washers about \$.30 per washer (Volume discount)

Each post would cost 10.71 (Tube) + 19.98 (Regular Concrete) + 4.40 (Bolt.) = 35.09 not counting tax or discount, this is a preliminary estimate.

Depending on the materials, we need 18 donations of \$50 to cover the cost of materials and "unanticipated expenses" for the fence or \$900. Can you buy a post? We will keep updating this list as we go.
